Kaiser Permanente Community Fund awards 22 grants in the Pacific Northwest 2012 Fast Facts

The Kaiser Permanente Community Fund (KPCF) at Northwest Health Foundation was established in December 2004 to advance the health of the communities served by Kaiser Permanente Northwest. The fund — a partnership between Kaiser Permanente Northwest and the Northwest Health Foundation — has awarded more than \$22 million in grants to organizations throughout the region.

The fund supports community-driven initiatives to improve the conditions and opportunities that result in a healthier, more equitable region. It is governed by an 11-member advisory board, which requested letters of inquiry from interested organizations within two tracks: capacity-building and implementation. Requests were thoroughly reviewed by the KPCF advisers, the Kaiser Permanente national board, and the Northwest Health Foundation board.
